RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

For many people, Christmas and Church are inextricably linked. From candlelit carol services to delightful nativity plays to fun-filled Christingle services, this is often the one point in the year when people reconnect with the traditions of faith. So what does Christmas mean in a year when most of what we normally do has been suspended or scaled back in the interests of public health and

saving lives? Do we just give it a miss, declare Christmas 2020 'cancelled', and make a new year's resolution to be back in 2021?

Although I can't tell you exactly what Christmas will look like, it will undoubtedly be different to other Christmases we have experienced. But Christmas has not been banned as it was during the English Protectorate of 1653-59. Nor do we need to celebrate Christmas secretly as Christians must do in parts of the world where Christianity is prohibited. We are instead being asked to celebrate it differently and creatively.

Christmas is usually a time spent with family and friends, when there are parties and socialising, when carols are sung, of searching out perfect presents in crowded shops. But that is not the heart of Christmas. The heart of Christmas is the yearly remembrance of the hopeful story, that God, in Jesus Christ, became a human being. Although we usually remember it together, we could just as easily remember it alone, because the whole point is that we are no longer alone because, in Jesus Christ, God becomes Emmanuel – God with us.

Sometimes I find the ways we traditionally celebrate Christmas to be out of sync with what it is that we are seeking to remember. Celebrating a child born in poverty by eating and drinking to excess and spending money we can't afford on gifts that people don't need seems a little strange. This year, we have an opportunity, if we want to, to dial it down a little. To focus on the story which, whether you believe it to be true or understand it as a sacred myth, urges us to be the best people we can be. People who care for others, who see the value in those that society overlooks. People who recognise that connecting with something bigger than ourselves is important. People who take the most difficult of circumstances and make something truly beautiful. Resilient people who rely on God.

We might not be able to hold the usual Christmas services this year, but there is a certain symmetry with that first Christmas. Mary and Joseph faced shut doors in their search for a safe place to give birth to Jesus, yet he was born anyway. And make no mistake about it, despite everything Christmas will happen anyway – for it cannot be cancelled!
