THE CHASE BENEFICE - FEBRUARY

Dear Friends,

January is a difficult month at the best of times. The festive season is long over, the weather is poor, the days don't seem to be getting noticeably longer and now we are in another national lockdown. In January we need to have something to look forward to. In good times, this is the month we plan what we might do in the coming year, who we might visit, which grandchildren might come to stay, where we might go on holiday. But this year is starting in such an uncertain way that we can make none of those plans. Rather we look on as so many in our country and our world face the terrible consequences of the pandemic. There seems nothing practical we can do except as praying bystanders. But as is the way with the spiritual life, there is always light in the darkness. This dark month reveals to us some chinks of light, for the month of January in the Church is celebrated as the season of Epiphany. During this season we reflect on the extraordinary way the light of the Incarnation - when God became human in the form of Jesus Christ - is spread from its minute beginnings in the Bethlehem manger to the wider world, and even to us in our darkness. As Isaiah prophesied: "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples, but the Lord shall arise upon you, and his glory shall appear over you." The season began with the journey of the Magi, following the star. In the weeks that follow, we reflect on the Baptism of Christ — Christ's going public to the waiting world; we hear how the first followers of Jesus were called; and, we hear of some of the miracles that Jesus preformed. The season ends on the 2nd February with the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, or Candlemas, as it is more commonly known. Our attention then turns towards Lent and the events of Holy Week and that first Easter morning, when Jesus rose from the grave, shattering the darkness of death and promising new life for all. None of us knows what this year has in store for us, but there is hope. One of the names of Jesus, which we use particularly at Christmas, is "Emmanuel'. Translated it means quite simply, "God with us". And God is with us now and will be with us as go into tomorrow and all the tomorrows. Emmanuel. God with us.

A separate report regarding the Parish Council's key priorities is included separately. Other areas of concern included:-

- a) Dog fouling there is an increase in dog fouling around the village. Please use the bins provided. The dog population seems to have increased over the past year and we all need to clear up after our dogs.
- b) Overhanging vegetation from residents' gardens onto public footpaths Please prune back overhanging vegetation from properties to ensure that public footpaths are accessible. The owners near Cling Clang Lane have been contacted and the Highways Department has been informed

- regarding the continuing drainage problems at the end of Cling Clang Lane.
- c) Enstone Airfield Information will be put into next month's magazine and website of whom to contact with concerns regarding the airfield. The Parish Council is contacting the Civil Aviation Authority.
- d) The grass cutting contracts will remain the same i.e. the verges along The Drive will be cut monthly during the grass cutting season.
- e) The Hoar Stones the tidying of this area is currently being considered the land is owned by Ditchley Park and the Parish Council is in discussions with Ditchley Park regarding this.

ENSTONE PARISH COUNCIL PARISH SURVEY - ACTIONS 2021

Enstone Parish Council wishes to thank the residents who completed the recent survey/questionnaire. It has proved to be most beneficial in determining our priorities for the next few years. We will be publishing further responses to the survey in the Ensign and website over the next few months starting with the key priorities.

The following key areas have been identified in order of priority:

1. Roads and Signage

- a. To install improved digital speed indicator devices at both ends of Enstone, along the A44.
- b. To have improved signage at both ends of the A44, the B4022, Banbury Road and Charlbury Road when entering Enstone.
- c. To fund a feasibility study (organised by Oxfordshire County Council) for 20 mph signs along The Drive, Coxs Lane, Cleveley Road, Lidstone Road, along the B4030 from the A44 junction to Church Enstone and along the A44 through Enstone.
- d. To have a one-way system at the village shop.

The Parish Council has set aside £15,000 in the current budget towards the above works.

2. Footpaths

e. Repair of the Planks – Oxfordshire County Council aims to repair this area in spring/summer 2021. The repair works will be paid for by OCC and the Parish Council. The Parish Council has budgeted £5,000.00 towards the works.

The Parish Council will keep you appraised of progress over the coming months.
